### **MN DEED Acknowledges Critical Work of Print**

From the outpouring of requests from print service providers, PIM, and state officials, the MN Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) has updated the <u>Critical Workers Definitions and Clarifications Document</u>, clearly expressing the essential work of print.

Clarification added March 27, 2020: Workers supporting printing operations that supply Critical Sectors are exempt; other printing workers are not exempted

This statement honors the work our industry is doing to suppress the spread of the virus and the economic impact of the pandemic. What does it mean for you? For example, if your company is creating signage or collateral for grocery or hardware stores, public health institutions, or municipalities, these are deemed essential and you are serving "an essential supply chain." The same is true if you are serving clients with essential work in food and agriculture, health and safety, faith leaders, and numerous others. Review the <u>essential sectors</u> to determine your essential status, and let us know at PIM if you have any questions.

States neighboring Minnesota have yet to mandate the closures of non-essential businesses. Before these orders occur, we need to act now. PIM has already sent letters in support of the essentialness of print to the Governors of Iowa, Nebraska, South and North Dakota. To keep up the pressure, we need to make our essential role clear to officials throughout your region. # **Utilizing the SBA Disaster Loan Recovery Program**



With the recent introduction of the Small Business

Administration's Disaster Loan Recovery Program, there are many questions about what the loans do and do not entail. As more details have become clear, Todd Lesley of Bedford Financial has crafted a short guide to answer some of the most pressing questions about the Economic Injury Disaster Loans.

1. No collateral is needed for loans \$25,000 or less. Anything larger and the SBA will need to take business collateral. If there is no business collateral though, it's not necessarily a deal killer. For example, a staffing company typically does not have collateral other than receivables.

- 2. Repayment does not start for 12 months.
- 3. Rate is 3.75% and terms are between 15 and 30 years.
- 4. These are not grants, and the loans DO have to be paid back.
- 5. Use of proceeds...fixed debt, payroll, payables, working capital, etc. Not to be used to refinance debt unless it's another shorter term recovery loan. This is not an expansion loan or business acquisition loan.
- 6. If you have a line of credit with a bank that is not being fully utilized you can still apply with SBA for this loan.
- 7. You don't need to provide tax returns on loans \$500,000 or less. You will need to sign a form 4506 so that the SBA can get a copy of your most recently filed returns.
- 8. They are getting help from FEMA to assist with the application process. The system is overloaded and your application, and while worth the wait, will take some time due to the overload of requests.
- 9. It will help to show the economic injury you are suffering or are about to suffer. Historical tax returns would help your case. If you are a seasonal business be sure and show the impact this will have.

## **Small Business Owners' Guide to the CARES Act**

The programs and initiatives in the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act* that was just passed by Congress are intended to assist business owners with whatever needs they have right now. When implemented, there will be many new resources available for small businesses, as well as certain non- profits and other employers. This guide provides information about the major programs and initiatives that will soon be available from the Small Business Administration (SBA) to address these needs, as well as some additional tax provisions that are outside the scope of SBA.

## **Unemployment Benefits State Resources**

Those eligible for unemployment benefits should apply through their state's unemployment website immediately upon becoming eligible for compensation through the links below.

<u>Iowa | Minnesota | Nebraska | North Dakota | South Dakota</u>

These state unemployment benefits have been extended by an additional 13 weeks in all US states.

#### Additional Federal Government Supplemental Unemployment

Through the CARES Act signed last week, individuals would receive an additional \$600 per week on top of their state unemployment benefits. It is unclear if recipients would need to apply separately for this supplemental benefit. Stay tuned for more information.

### **PIM Health & Safety Moment**

To reduce the spread of infectious diseases such as COVID-19, businesses are asked to **clean and disinfect high touch surfaces** including tables, doorknobs, light switches, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets etc.



- The CDC recommends businesses use:
- 1. An EPA-registered household disinfectant. Click here,
- 2. a diluted bleach solution or
- 3. clean with a solution of at least 70% alcohol.

Employees should follow the cleaning chemical instructions to ensure safe and effective use of the product.

- While cleaning, employees should wear gloves if available.
  - Ensure your employees are trained in safe glove usage.
    - Show this video (link) to your employees so they understand how to safety remove contaminated gloves.
- Always wash your hands after removing gloves.
